Purpose – Why am I writing? (to entertain, inform, persuade or communicate)

Audience – For whom am I writing? (teacher, classmate, friend)

Topic – What am I writing about? (this will be given to you)

Form – What kind of writing am I doing? (a letter, short story, essay, article)

Adding Colorful Details

Details are what bring stories to life and make them interesting and unusual. They add flavor to your thoughts and experiences. Adding details will greatly improve your writing.

Look at the following sentences.

The boy ate a sandwich.

There is something missing? What boy? What kind of sandwich? Colorful details would make this sentence much better to read.

The nine-year-old boy with muddy hands took a huge bite out of a thick, drippy jelly sandwich.

Isn't that a better sentence? Yes, it is!

Stick To The Topic

It is very important that once the teacher has given you a writing topic (**prompt**) that you stick to it. Make sure that as you write the topic given is all that you discuss. Don't get off track in your writing. Using a **topic sentence** is a must at the beginning of each paragraph you write. Remember that the topic sentence covers all that you plan to write about in each paragraph.
